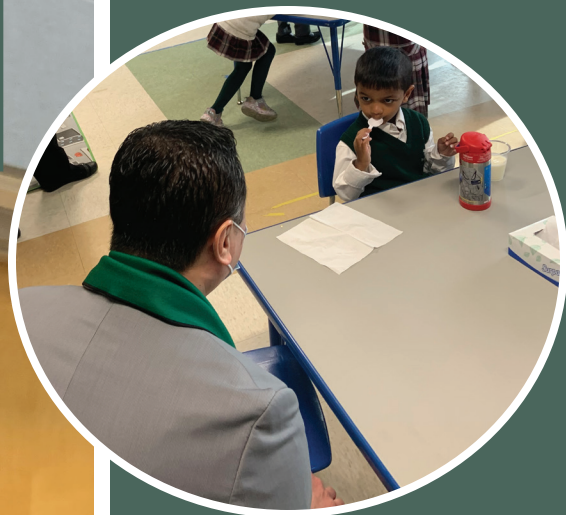

June Is a Time For Celebration

This year, despite the restrictions placed on us by COVID-19, we managed to unearth some purely joyful moments across the school.

The Lower School partnered with the World Urban Pavilion with global initiatives like archiKID, the sustainable cities building project.

Highlights of our FIRST LEGO League Robotics Programme were we fielded four teams and all four made the Ontario Championship; two teams won the Ontario Innovation Award, Ctrl-Z represented Ontario at the Worlds, and TransporTech represented Ontario at the Canada Cup competition.

In the Prep School, our Round Square Programme went virtual and our students participated in the Round Square Postcard Project and the TED Event Collaboration. We are also considering Virtual Exchanges with Belgrano School in South America. Students were trained on Baraza group discussions. Our Global Education Programme provided conferences, workshops and dialogues that focussed on Sustainable Development goals.

Our Gryphons were unstoppable and we fielded teams in all three terms. We renamed our Houses, participated in the Munk School of Global Affairs and Public Policy; the Youth and Philanthropy Initiative, hosted an online debating tournament and had our first ever whole school



Remembrance Day Assembly. We also hosted our first ever Model United Nations (BVG MUN).

Our bands and choirs performed in pre-recorded concerts, thanks to the dedication and enthusiasm of our I.T. Department and our wonderful Music faculty, and the Upper School play - *Pack of Lies* - premiered to the whole student body in April.

We hosted our Semi-Formal and soon, we will have Prom and Grade 8 Dance and our Graduation Celebrations for Grades 5, 8 and, of course, Grade 12.

Closing Ceremonies will be celebrated across the school for all students as we close the book on yet another great year.

As this is the last time I will pen this newsletter article, I want to wish all our Bayview Glen families, and students the best. I look forward to connecting with you at various intervals as the school celebrates its milestones in the future.

Grade 5 Love Letters to the Land

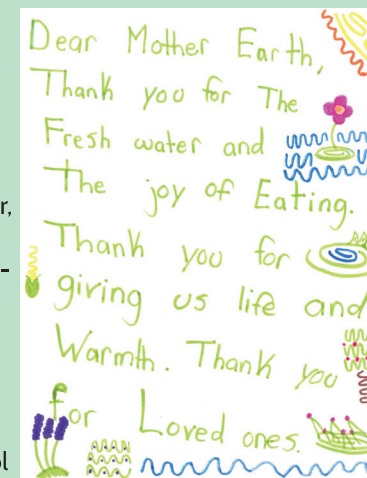

On April 13 2022, the students in Grade 5 had the pleasure of meeting with Aqua Nibii Waawaaskone, an Anishinaabe and Métis singer, artist and activist. She comes from the Turtle Clan, who have a deep spiritual connection to Mother Earth.

Aqua showed us the land that she was living on in Scugog and explained to us how she had reclaimed the land that had once belonged to her people but was conquered by Europeans. Through many examples, she emphasized the importance of being grateful for everything that we have because sometimes Indigenous peoples do not have the same opportunities as us. We realized that not one Grade 5 student knew a person who was Indigenous in our school. We have many opportunities that other schools might not have, and the fact that not all Indigenous peoples have the same opportunities as we do, resonated with us. Aqua also highlighted how the Indigenous peoples have been responsible for teaching our ancestors valuable lessons that we continue to use in our daily lives, and we should be immensely grateful.

During our time with Aqua, we had an important discussion on how Mother Earth has provided us with everything that we need to survive, and that we should be extremely grateful towards it. Earth has provided us with everything from things as little as recreational activities to items that are imperative for survival. On the day of our meeting, we were asked to have water, a food item and our most prized possession. We had to think about what life would be like if we did not have these items that were so important to us. We all knew that life would be extremely hard. We reflected on this and wrote our own “love letters” to the land, which were similar to a Land Acknowledgement, helping us to appreciate the beautiful land that we live on, even more. Every time we meet with Aqua, we learn many important things, and how we could treat the land much better than we currently do. We will always cherish our discussions with Aqua.

With Aqua's guidance, and Dr. Mantie's mentorship, Grade 11 students Teddy Porfiris and Daniel Gonzalez came up with the idea to plant an Every Child Matters garden in our school. Every year, each Grade 5 student will tend to the garden, and plant their own Black-Eyed-Susans, which are native to this part of Ontario. We aim to plant medicinal plants in the future, as our garden develops. This is going to be created in remembrance of all those who have been affected by the Residential School System. It will be a place where we can reflect and remember. This is acting upon the 62nd and 63rd calls to action from The Truth and Reconciliation Commission of Canada.

Ctrl-Z: A Year in Review

Our robotics journey started in October. Because of COVID-19, our initial meetings had to be through Zoom, which was not ideal.

Once we started meeting in person, we were all very excited to start designing, building and coding our robot. We also did a lot of brainstorming for our Innovation Project, with the theme being CARGO CONNECT. After experimenting with different solutions, we created the Z-Box, which is a 100% recyclable, eco-friendly, easy-to-use, cost-efficient and tidy packaging solution. By researching about packaging and containerboard, we came to a deeper understanding about current global issues, including low plastic recycling rates and waste generation in packaging.

We had the opportunity to meet with three leading experts in the packaging industry before creating the Z-Box: James Downham, CEO of PAC Global; Allen Kirkpatrick, Executive Director of the Canadian Corrugated and Containerboard Association (CCCA); and Robert Suga, the Director of Quality and Continuous Improvement at Atlantic Packaging. They taught us how containerboard is made and recycled, and helped us with idea generation. Afterwards, we presented our Z-Box to them, and they kindly gave us feedback.

We won our regional tournament in December and our provincial tournament in February. We showcased both our Robot Design and Innovation Project presentations to the judges, and they were all very impressed with our Z-Box design and how it can decrease plastic use in packaging.

We were also invited to go to the Ontario Innovation Celebration, where we got one of three champion's awards.

Since we won the provincial tournament, we got to go to the FIRST Championship in Houston. For the weeks leading up to the FIRST Championship, we all worked extremely hard to prepare the presentation materials such as banners, brochures, binders and different sizes of Z-Boxes. We were also nervous about contracting COVID-19 right before the FIRST Championship, which would stop us from going to Houston.

Finally, we all got on a plane, safe and sound, heading to Houston! There were over 100 teams from all over the world. We all showcased our robots and innovation projects in our pit areas. We all exchanged souvenirs. We gave out lots of Canada flags and pins, and freshly made buttons with our team logo. At the awards ceremony, one of our three coaches, Mr. Eric Borromeo, won the Coach's Award, which he greatly deserved.

Thanks to all Ctrl-Z team members: Leo and Darius Cazzin, Elina Valaee, Brianna Lovshin, Isaac Cung and me. We sincerely thank our coaches and mentors for volunteering endless hours and effort in teaching us and guiding us through this amazing journey. Bayview Glen's FIRST LEGO League Programme: The Reclamation of a Reputation for Excellence

When the COVID-19 Pandemic came to North America, Bayview Glen's FIRST LEGO League team, All Systems Code won their Champions Award from the East Ontario Championships and planning their visit to South Carolina. The team sadly never travelled. In the 2020-2021 school year, a lot of effort was placed into running internal robotics clubs. The effort was tremendous and many of our students and volunteers were exceptional, but it was just not the same with the mandated provincial COVID-19 protocols.

Fast forward to this year – another year in which the Pandemic was on the forefront of our minds – the goal was to get back to the Bayview Glen standard of excellence in FIRST LEGO League Robotics and innovation. After hours and hours of problem-solving, a safe online tryout format was created. The almost 100 students who tried out from Grades 5 to 8 showcased that Bayview Glen has so many capable and engaged students.

Teams were formed for the fall, winter and spring seasons. Everyone who tried out would get a learning experience. Mentors from the Upper School volunteered, parents pitched in and our newly hired robotics co-ordinator, Mr. Benjamin McCord partnered with Ctrl-Z coach, Mr. Eric Borromeo and teacher coaches Ms. Julia Warren and Ms. Meredith Langston; Bayview Glen's FIRST LEGO League Robotics Programme was back. All

in all, over 120 students at Bayview Glen have either participated or mentored in the Grades 5 to 8 programme. All four fall teams (TransporTech, ConnecTech, DARSELLAS, and Ctrl-Z) won awards at their regional championships and for the first time ever, all made it to the East Ontario Championships. At the East Ontario Championships, Ctrl-Z won the 1st place Champions Award and was invited to compete in the World Championships in Houston, Texas this past April. TransporTech and Ctrl-Z both went to the Ontario Innovation Celebration and won Champions Awards. To end the season on a high, TransporTech won the Canada Cup Challenge in May.

While the fall teams were competing, four teams worked hard together to compete during the Winter Season which culminated in a finals showcase in early April. At the same time, the spring teams were able to kick off their season which will end on June 10. Both the winter and spring seasons saw students embrace the design-thinking

This has been one of the most successful FIRST LEGO League seasons ever. As preparations are made for the 2022-2023 season, I offer a huge thank you to all who have been involved. Collectively, there have been thousands of collective hours of work that have gone into creating this success and moving forward Bayview Glen is ready to hit the ground running in September 2023.

Learning the Gears: A Reflection of the FLL Coaching Experience

When I first began as a coach in the Fall of 2021, I was a bit unsure of what I was getting into. I had no experience with FIRST LEGO League, and my interactions with Bayview Glen up to that point had been almost entirely online. In a past life I was a pilot and find STEM learning to be my passion. This was going to be exciting. I had led some online robotics courses in the first school year of the pandemic, but did not fully realize how deeply rooted FLL is in the culture of the school.

I quickly learned that Bayview Glen is a place with a strong sense of community and responsibility. The students, staff and families I interacted with made me feel welcome. They graciously imparted their wisdom, skills and time to help make my transition go smoothly.

The amount of time and energy that teams put into the season is remarkable. I coached two Fall teams, ConnecTech and TransporTech. Both had solid, dedicated team members, as well as exceptional parent volunteers and student mentors. We were on a tight schedule, but both teams developed unique

innovative solutions to transportation-related issues, performed impressively with their robot games, won awards at their respective Regional Tournaments, and progressed to Provincials.

“Fall team” is a bit of a misnomer, as TransporTech continued to work well into the Winter and Spring as we progressed to the Ontario Innovation Celebration and the Canada Cup. The students were eager to continuously improve their project and robot game coding as these tournaments approached.

I also coached the Winter and Spring intramural teams, with the invaluable help of coach Goldie and some amazing student mentors. In all my experiences this year, it has been evident that Bayview Glen clearly instills a healthy sense of “co-opertition” and gracious professionalism in its student body. With a year under my belt, I look forward to making the experience even more successful next year. I look forward to seeing both new and familiar faces for another exciting season this Fall!

Round Square Baraza Leader Training

Seeking Solutions on Earth Day at the Prep School

Friday, April 22 was Earth Day and we as a global community took pause to consider the impact of human choices on the environment. Rather than simply acknowledge the day in passing, Prep School students were immersed in an afternoon of discussion, reflection and action. Our afternoon started with an inspiring talk from Naila Moloo, a 15-year-old climate activist who is working to find a solution to the problem of single-use plastics and their impact on our environment. She challenged our students to take action and see that they too can make meaningful impacts on our world. She shared practical insights with our students about how to network and bring your innovations to life. From there, Madelle Sabodach and Mr. Baumgartner designed a problem-based activity that challenged students to delve into important environmental issues needing our immediate attention. Students looked at industrialized meat farming, waste generated from wrapping paper, and the environmental impact of the Russia/Ukraine conflict. Each grade was tasked with researching their problem and developing a solution for it. It was truly amazing to see each class engaged in the work of putting themselves in the shoes of a persona, considering the various impacts of their problem on communities and our world, and working collaboratively to define their solution.

The result of this amazing problem-based approach to learning and thinking about Earth Day was a video produced by each homeroom class, detailing their unique solution to these complex problems. Inspiring students to see not only the problems that afflict our world but empowering them to see that they can generate solutions – and bring them to fruition is the mindset we want to develop in our young people. We have had the pleasure to watch these videos at our Prep assemblies and can confidently say that this day was not only fun but time extremely well spent.

Bayview Glen Reads Initiative

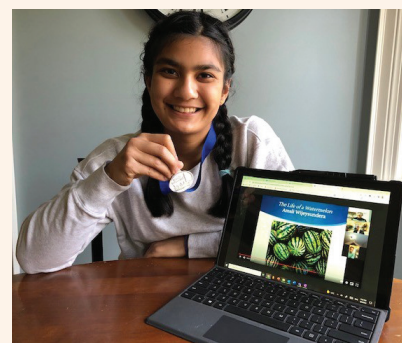

While Bayview Glen was only able to submit a single team this year, we were still able to place fifth in the tournament, narrowly missing a berth to the finals. The success of this year's tournament would not have been possible were it not for the gracious volunteers that we had as our judges over the two-day contest. A huge thank you also goes out to Alan Gao and Reetaban Bhattacharjee, the Bayview Glen Debate Club Heads, as well as Bayview Glen Alumnus Khalil Jamal '21 and Teacher Advisor Mr. Stott, for organizing and co-ordinating the tournament behind the scenes. The success of these tournaments over the past two years has served to motivate the club to begin organizing an in-person iteration of this event for next year, so stay tuned!

Bigger Global Ideas

For the past nine years, Bayview Glen has participated in the Global Ideas Institute at the University of Toronto. This year-long activity is an initiative organized by the Munk School of Global Affairs and Public Policy. Their guiding principle is that in an increasingly globalized world it is becoming more and more important for students to learn about the world and to think in a global context. The goal of this programme is to provide students with the tools, knowledge, and guidance to work through a challenging global issue. Each year students are presented with a real-world problem with no present solution that global experts are working very hard to solve. These are hard problems in need of creative answers, and students and their ideas are taken very seriously by the school and their international partners.

Students are asked to consider the end users of the solutions they design to ensure they are appropriate to the socio-economic and cultural situations in the area under study. They are also exposed to speakers who are experts in their fields from all around the world. In considering solutions to these 'wicked problems', Bayview Glen students are being asked to consider global problems, as well as their place as global citizens and the part they can play in meeting the challenges of an increasingly complex world.

This year's challenge is one that is reflective and relevant to the effects of the COVID-19 era. Socio-economic status is a significant determinant of the health and well-being of populations worldwide. Marginalized communities face systemic barriers to services needed to be healthy. This year's challenge was how can we advance health equity for marginalized communities during and beyond the COVID-19 pandemic?

This year's team consisted of Caitlin Leung, Fiona Wan, Mehmet Alpacar, Soha Jamal and Avery Zhou. The Bayview Glen team decided to focus their problem and solution on the topic of access to safe drinking water in many First Nations communities here in Ontario. Their strategy was a mixture of a practical approach to water safety and advocacy and a curriculum-based approach to creating young activists and advocates to help solve this problem. They represented the school very well, receiving reflective feedback from the panel of experts and earned a "Superlative Certificate" from this year's symposium as "Most Effective Communicators"! They should be proud of their efforts!

This past May, the campus was visited by retired Bayview Glen educator Mrs. Jennifer Gilfillan - a long standing educator who positively impacted many students. The reason for her visit was to drop off a very special Bayview Glen artifact for the school's archives: Brigitte Chan's "teaching kilt". Uniquely, Brigitte would wear the traditional Bayview Glen tartan while teaching French.

Brigitte started teaching at Bayview Glen in the early 70s and retired in 2013. Through her career and in everything she did, Brigitte vivaciously lived life to the fullest. As many staff have said, Brigitte was a one-of-one. Affectionately known as Madame Chan, she was loved by all our young Bayview Glen students. Many who are well into their adult lives have said that Mme. Chan sparked a curiosity and appreciation for the French language. In late December, Brigitte passed away after a battle with cancer.

When the Bayview Glen staff found out that Brigitte was not well, many of the staff who worked with her gathered to reminisce about their times with her. These interactions were always accompanied by laughter and good cheer. Mme. Chan made everyone feel like they belonged and wherever she was, people wanted to be a part of that activity. In conversation with Brigitte's son, Dan, he told me: "My strongest memory of Mom was as a Bayview Glen French teacher. In speaking to her friends and colleagues, the word kids often came up. She would work as much as needed and meet any challenge if it benefitted the 'kids.'" Needless to say, it was a sad day when Bayview Glen received the news that Mme. Chan had passed.

As the 2022 school year ends, Brigitte Chan continues to be missed, but the memories of her time at Bayview Glen live on. Having Mme. Chan's teaching kilt as part of the school's archives is both an important artifact for the archives and a great reminder of a late educator who gave everything to her profession as a Bayview Glen French teacher.
