The transformation of the Preschool and Lower School building continues with significant steps forward, on several fronts, since the start of spring.


Once open, cavernous spaces, each floor undergoing renovations in the northwest corner of the building, are coming to life with areas now divided into classrooms and other educational spaces.



Global Studies Certificate in Action

Most people are very aware of homelessness, but an injustice often overlooked is the impact of homelessness on menstruators. Without access to safe and hygienic menstrual products, menstruators struggle to attend school and work, remain active or maintain positive mental health, essentially living in a state of period poverty. Period poverty is generally defined as the inability to access sanitary menstrual products, an issue that can be debilitating for many menstruators. It occurs due to limited access and increased cost of menstrual products, and the social stigma surrounding menstruation. This debilitating issue significantly affects students, low-income and homeless women and girls, non-binary and transgender individuals, and imprisoned menstruators. Using the money we raised through an awareness walk and donations, we purchased 3,684 pads and 4,420 tampons. We donated the entirety of our collection to the Red Door Shelter, an organization that helps women and children find a safe living space.

During the first week of May, Grade 7 students Authority Conservation Authority to revitalize the natural



Support Strategies for the Home Stretch

s we approach the end of the school year, students may face a mix of emotions and some emerging issues. Due to their excitement for school to end, some may be more disruptive. They may need some redirection and reminders to focus, manage their behaviours, and help to understand that finishing homework still matters. Others may lose their motivation to finish strong. They will need encouragement to push to the finish line.

For the first time since before the onset of the pandemic, students are back to writing culminating exams in person. Some will likely experience test anxiety. Remind them to use self-help strategies such as good exam preparation, positive self-talk, deep breaths, and getting enough sleep. If the symptoms of anxiety become excessive, don't hesitate to seek mental health support.

On the social side, some friendships may be strained. It is natural that students of all ages will have emerging friendship issues to work through. Their best friend back in September may not be the same this month. Keep the lines of communication open with your child, listen, and help them alleviate their stress. In many situations, the friendship will get restarted quickly, especially for the younger ones.

The summer holidays may be lonely and boring for some students with feelings of dread over separation from their friends. Being out of school disrupts routine. It can be challenging for children who spend time away from their primary residence with another family member during the break. Try and maintain open communication with your child so you can determine the kind of support they need.

Graduating students can experience a mix of emotions too. Some are ready to go on to the next chapter, even with a fear of the unknown. There can be concerns about adjusting to life after high school, starting in a new school, losing friends, taking a gap year, working, etc. Watch for signs of sadness and address them. Empathy shows them they are not alone and that they are understood.

Some students may be dealing with disappointment over their university applications, such as not getting into their preferred university or programmes. Parents can show them how to cope. Displaying strong negative emotions (deep sadness. anger, etc.) as a parent, can inadvertently impact a child too.

In her book, The Emotional Lives of Teenagers, Lisa Damour, PhD., insists when teens are unsettled due to disappointments, a parent's ability to stay calm will help a child regain emotional control. She also asserts that adolescents are protected against future significant psychological concerns when their parents respond to issues supportively. It provides children with immediate psychological comfort. If you find your child repeatedly ruminating about their situation, please do not hesitate to seek support.
























Parent Appreciation Reception

Preschool and Lower School (BG2 to Grade 5)

A Moment in Time

et's talk about ephemeral mark making and the preschooler. We often see young children exploring and creating with items that are transient. They do not have permanence and there is beauty in that impermanence. Making ephemeral marks allows the process of making to be fulfilling enough to be the focus. To appreciate that not everything we value must be material, and to simply be present and enjoy those moments in time as they come. With the arrival of spring, our young researchers continue to explore the land and the nature around us. We quickly learn that everything in nature is ever changing, nothing is static. The branch we used to crawl under has fallen and is now a log to jump over. The buds we explored last week have now bloomed into flowers, the snail that lived in the shell has left behind a fascinating trial, and the dew on the grass that left prints on our papers has dried to reveal bright green grass. We learn to welcome, notice, and value these changes seen in nature and the land we are on, leaning into the marks that can be created – never taking the first or last of things on the land - however, working in the beauty by using what is here in the current moment.

Another benefit of ephemeral mark making is that it is a low-pressure activity that allows children to express themselves freely without worrying about the permanence of their work. This aspect is particularly important for preschoolers, who are still developing their sense of self and creativity. By allowing children to experiment with different materials and techniques, preschoolers can gain confidence in their abilities and feel empowered to create.

As educators we are fortunate to be curious researchers alongside our students, which allows us to also take moments to sit in the beauty and wonder of the transience of life through exploration with ephemeral marks. There is great beauty present in the simplest of joys. Just look through the lens of a child and you will see it making its mark, if only for a moment in time.



Making History: Our Journey to the Worlds

There are simply no shortcuts.

What it takes to get to the pinnacle of robotics success at the high school level is a journey that stretches a person, their grit, and the learning in every which way.

Bayview Glen School's FIRST Robotics Team made school history this spring, when the 33-member team qualified for the

More than 30.000 students and staff from around the world descended on George Brown Convention Centre in Houston for the four-day competition.

The extraordinary accomplishment took months of commitment, concerted effort, and sacrifice from student team members and staff moderators.

Here's what it took, by the numbers:

1.750	Hours in the lab	(Pre-season)
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3,150 Hours in the lab (Build season)

Hours at competition (District event 1) 1,260

1,260 Hours at competition (District event 2)

1,890 Hours at competition (Provincials)

1,704 Hours at competition (Worlds)

11,014 Total hours

The FIRST Robotics Competition (FRC) season is broken up into three distinct seasons. Much like training for any endurance sport, during pre-season the team spends time building their base knowledge, fitness, and skills. During the build season, team members hone and perfect their specific skills through long hours of practice and repetition, so that they can peak at the right time and compete at an elite level. Setbacks are common during this phase, just like an athlete getting injured when training for a sport at a high level. This is when the true character of the individual is tested. In preparing to compete at an endurance event, the time spent training is directly proportional to the chance of completing the event without injury.

If the goal is to compete and meet a world standard, then you must be willing to make an even higher level of commitment, which inevitably involves making sacrifices and persevering when things don't work out as planned.

That is exactly what members of the ALT-F4 team did this year!



This season was the most successful in our short history as a team. We were finalists at the Newmarket event, receiving the Creativity Award. At the Humber College competition, we finisheed first, receiving ALT-F4's first-ever Blue Banner as well as the Excellence in Engineering Award. This qualified us for the Provincials in Hamilton, where once again we had a strong showing and qualified for the FIRST Robotics World Championships in Houston, Texas!

At the Worlds, a strong performance in the qualifying round resulted in a 9th place ranking in a field of 78 teams, qualifying the ALT-F4 team for the playoffs as one of eight Alliance Captains - and prompting the President of FIRST Robotics Canada to send ALT-F4 a congratulatory message for having the countries third-best robot. During the playoffs, one of our alliance partner's robots broke its scoring mechanism, resulting in a playoff loss by one point. While this result was temporarily disappointing, the lessons learned through this experience and over the course of the season have made us stronger and more motivated as a team for next season.

What it also takes is a village.

Our heartfelt thanks to Bayview Glen's administration and staff for their support throughout the season and to our parents for sponsoring team meals, driving team members to events early in the morning and picking them up late at night. We are grateful for all that you do!



Studying AI

he launch of ChatGPT by Open AI in November 2022 took the world by storm. From the start it was clear that the use of large language models (LLMs) could potentially be disruptive in many fields, including education. Some educational institutions, like the New York public schools, reacted with an outright ban of the use AI and ChatGPT, while others like the International Baccalaureate Schools took steps to incorporate its use.

Our mission at Bayview Glen: Whole Child, Whole Life, Whole World, embraces the world beyond our walls and aims to prepare our students to be confident, creative, and contributing members of our global society.

In the Upper School, we decided to form an AI study group to ensure that our teachers are prepared and trained to support our students in the constructive and ethical use of Al. In our February edition of The Glen, we promised to keep you informed of our progress.

Some of the important questions we have been discussing, both within Bayview Glen as well as in the Conference of Independent School Ontario (CIS Ontario) are:

How can we incorporate the use of AI in our classrooms in a responsible way?

When is AI useful for educational purposes and when is it not?

What are the consequences for Academic Integrity and our policies guarding it?

In June, four members of the AI Study Group will organize Professional Development for the faculty in the Upper School and in August, the Future Design School will offer a workshop on The Educational Impact of Artificial Intelligence and ChatGPT for our full faculty.
